

		Some Key Differences Between Bullying and G	Conflict (based on the work of Dan Olweus, 1993)
	NO	Normal Conflict	Bullying Behavior
		Occasional	Is a repeated happening
		Not pre-planned, in the heat of the moment	Premeditated, on purpose, intentional, planned
		Genuine upset to both parties	Person being bullied is more upset
		Trying to work things out	Trying to be the one in control
		Not trying to take something from someone	Want to take power or possessions from someone
		Both parties admit some responsibility	Blame is laid on the person who is bullied
		Effort to solve the problem by both parties	No effort to solve the problem by the person bullying





How Does The Law Define Bullying?

IC 20-33-8-0.2 – "Bullying" means:

- •Overt (intentional), unwanted, <u>repeated</u> acts or gestures including:
 - Verbal or written communications or images transmitted in any manner (including digitally or electronically)
 - Physical acts committed, aggression, or any other behaviors that are committed by a student or group of students against another student with the intent to
 - Harass, ridicule, humiliate, intimidate, or harm the targeted student and
 - Create for the targeted student an **<u>objectively</u>** *hostile school environment*

Staff Training

What Happens After A Report Is Made?

- Investigation begins within 2 work days
- Investigator determines whether the conduct amounts to "bullying" or discriminatory harassment
 - If the conduct amounts to "bullying," parents are notified within 4 work days
 - If the conduct does not amount to "bullying," it may be referred to appropriate school personnel
 - If the conduct is extreme, the Assistant Superintendent and law enforcement should be notified
- Investigation is concluded and investigator completes

BULLYING REPORT FORM

Complete and submit a bullying report online. You may include your name or remain anonymous.

Make school a bully-free zone.
