



 College Board program, AP Exam score dictates college credit, college discretion for assigning of credit


ACP (Advance College Project)

• Concurrent enrollment at Penn H.S. and IU, college credit awarded for grades C or higher, credit assigned directly to H.S. and college transcript

Dual Credit (Ivy Tech/PLTW)


 Concurrent enrollment at Penn H.S. and Ivy Tech (or other PLTW schools), college credit awarded for grades C or higher (some PLTW courses have additional requirements), credit assigned directly to H.S. and college transcript

Percent AP Scores




Penn High School AP Growth

Freshman Year:

- Engage in high school experience (Clubs, athletics, volunteer experiences)
- Grades
 - Work hard and take rigorous/relevant courses
- Self-evaluation
 - Career interests/goals (directed elective choices, Achievement Academy)
 - Personality profile (Ex. Self-Directed Search)

Sophomore Year:

- Online College Search:
 - IN colleges <u>www.triptocollege.org</u>
 - Nationwide <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>
- PSAT given statewide each October
 - Connect results to College Board/Khan Academy for tutoring
- Continue:
 - Relevant, rigorous coursework (appropriate balance)
 - Extracurricular involvement
 - Career/major reflection (Achievement Academy)

What is the PSAT?

- Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test
- Given to all 10th/11th grade students in Indiana
- A practice test that is comparable in content and experience to the SAT
- Qualifying scores from 11th grade test can connect students to the National Merit Scholarship Competition

Junior Year:

- **PSAT** (retake for practice)
- College visits -
 - Schedule visits (summer and throughout year) and create working college list
- Take SAT/ACT -
 - Winter or Spring for first test
- Scholarship Search -
 - Research potential scholarships and review financial aid options
- Continue:
 - Relevant, rigorous coursework
 - Extracurricular involvement (seek positions of leadership)
 - Career/major reflection (Achievement Academy)

Senior Year:

- ACT/SAT (retake as needed)
- College visits -
 - Continue visits in hopes of narrowing potential options
- Apply to college (Common Application vs. School Specific App.)
 - Most applications available starting Aug. 1 of senior year
- Send ACT/SAT scores
- Send official transcript (Common Application vs. Parchment)
- Apply for scholarships: @PennScholarship / KN News
- Complete FAFSA
 - Available Oct. 1 of senior year, due for state consideration by Apr. 15

Application Decision Plans and Deadlines:

- Early Action <u>typically</u> November 1
- Early Decision <u>typically</u> November 1 (Binding Agreement)
- Regular Action and/or Decision more variance but <u>typically</u>
 January 1 or February 1
- Rolling Admission latest deadline, <u>typically</u> late spring/early summer



Penn High School FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

What is the FAFSA?

 An application that examines the financial need of a family yearly to determine the amount of federal/state qualifying aid.

Who should submit a FAFSA?

• Every college bound senior

Why should someone submit a FAFSA?

- To determine if one qualifies for state or federal aid.
- To be eligible for specific scholarships or institutional aid programs.
- To offer potential to qualify for aid if family faced with major life changes (i.e. death, layoffs).


When is the FAFSA due?

Available Oct. 1 of senior year, due by Apr. 15 (for state consideration)

Federal Aid Application Process



Financial Aid

Cost of Attendance (COA) & Expected Family Contribution (EFC):

- COA is tuition, fees, room and board, transportation, etc. from each school
- EFC is from the information you enter on the FAFSA
- COA EFC = Financial Need
- Financial need will vary from school to school



Penn High School New Graduation Pathways (2023)

The purpose of Graduation Pathways is to ensure that every Hoosier student graduates from high school with:

- 1) A broad awareness of and engagement with individual career interests and associated career options;
- 2) A strong foundation of academic and technical skills; and
- Demonstrate employability skills that lead directly to meaningful opportunities for postsecondary education, training and gainful employment

Specifically, the pathway moves from a one-size-fits all approach where earning a diploma was dependent on passing graduation qualifying exams (ISTEP). Graduation pathways will allow students to select a pathway that aligns with their strengths and interests.

Penn High School Employability Skills (at least one)

Project Based Learning (PBL): Extended challenge

- Extended research project with presentation
- English class project and many others

Service-Based Learning (SBL): Meaningful service

- Participation in a meaningful volunteer engagement
- Engagement in school-based activity (co-curricular, extracurricular, sports and clubs)

Work-Based Learning (WBL): Employment experience

Internships and/or employment outside of the school day

Penn High School Post-Secondary Competencies

Postsecondary-Ready Competencies (Students must complete *at least one* of the following.)

- **Honors Designation**: Fulfill all requirements of either the Academic or Technical Honors designation; OR
- ACT: Minimum score of 18 in English, 22 in Math and 23 in Science; OR
- SAT: Minimum score of 480 in English and 530 in Math; OR
- **ASVAB**: Earn at least the minimum AFQT score of 31 to qualify for placement into one of the branches of the US military; OR
- State- and Industry-recognized Credential or Certification; OR
- Federally-recognized Apprenticeship; OR
- Career-Technical Education Concentrator: Must earn a C <u>average</u> or higher in at least 6 high school credits in a career sequence; OR
- **AP/Dual Credit/ Exams:** Must earn a C <u>average</u> or higher in at least three courses

Career-Technical Education Concentrator:

A student must earn a C average or higher in at least 6 high school credits in a career sequence. In collaboration with the EACC, Penn High School is able to offer 62 different career pathways.
