

# Elementary Teacher of the Year

## Rose Montgomery 1st Grade Teacher Prairie Vista Elementary School

With 31 years of service to P-H-M, Prairie Vista's Rose Montgomery has built a career grounded in compassion, relationships, and unwavering dedication to every child who walks through her door.

"To me, these children become part of my family the day they enter my classroom," Rose says. "And that connection doesn't end when the school year does."

That belief shapes every part of her teaching. Even before the school year begins, Rose contacts families—especially when she knows a child may face academic or emotional challenges. "It helps build a relationship before day one, so that students feel safe and supported from the start."

Throughout the year, Rose stays closely connected with families—calling not just to address concerns, but to celebrate growth. "I want parents to hear how passionate I am about their child's success," she explains. "Even the most reluctant student becomes part of my extended family by the end of the year."

Her colleagues see that same heart. "Rose is the kind of teacher who stays up late thinking of new ways to support her students," said Hayley McTigue. "Her creativity and compassion set her apart."

Rose sees teaching as far more than delivering standards. "Yes, we teach reading and math," she says, "but we also play basketball at recess, wipe tears, listen to stories, and give encouragement."

She is a fierce advocate for students with special needs, working closely with families to develop plans that support each child's academic, behavioral, and emotional success.

For Rose, the true legacy of teaching is emotional impact. "In 40 years, students won't remember the lesson you worked hardest on," she reflects. "They'll remember how you made them feel."

And thanks to Rose, they'll feel loved, believed in, and forever part of her classroom family.

# Secondary Teacher of the Year

# L.A. High 8th Grade Math Teacher Schmucker Middle School

Now in his 14th year teaching middle school math in P-H-M—first at Grissom and now at Schmucker—L.A. High has impacted generations of students with his steady commitment to academic excellence and student growth.

One of those students, now a colleague, is Schmucker school counselor Allie Marks, nominated him for Secondary Teacher of the Year. "Math was never my strength," she shared. "But Mr. High created a classroom where I felt safe to make mistakes and keep trying. Now, as his colleague, I see him doing the same for today's students—advocating for re-teaching strategies, supportive grading, and meaningful interventions."

L.A. was previously recognized in fall 2024 with a P-H-M Teacher Impact Award for achieving the highest student growth in 8th-grade math, as measured by ILEARN assessments. But his influence goes well beyond the numbers.

Known for his compassion and servant leadership, L.A. has championed fundraising efforts for Riley Hospital for Children—first as a participant, and now as lead organizer at both Grissom and Schmucker. His creative efforts, from trivia nights and pie-a-teacher contests to biking 150 miles to Indianapolis, have raised nearly \$60,000.

For L.A., student success means more than scores or metrics. "Success in education isn't just about grades. It's measured by the lasting, unquantifiable impact we have on those around us."

Allie agrees. "Mr. High is the kind of teacher who reaches the students who believe they can't learn. I'm proud to have been his student—and even prouder to now be his colleague."

# Whitney Hall Educational Assistant Penn High School

Since 2020, Whitney Hall has been a transformative presence in Penn High School's Exceptional Education Academy. With compassion, initiative, and an unshakable belief in her students' potential, she has made a profound impact. Her patient work with one primarily non-verbal student led to a remarkable breakthrough—the discovery that he could solve algebraic equations—revealing abilities that had previously gone unrecognized.

Colleagues describe Whitney as someone who jumps in without hesitation, no matter the challenge. During an adaptive PE session, she didn't think twice before diving into the pool to swim alongside students—demonstrating the kind of presence, care, and engagement that defines her every day.

Whether supporting students with IEPs, assisting classroom instruction, or mentoring fellow Educational Assistants, Whitney consistently goes above and beyond. She ensures that every learner receives individualized, compassionate support while also helping to strengthen the broader educational team.

Whitney also plays a key leadership role in shaping a positive culture at Penn. She co-founded the SITA Crew, a team of Educational Assistants who organize morale-boosting activities and staff recognition efforts—building connection and community within the Exceptional Education program.

In addition, she serves as coach of Penn's Unified Cornhole Team, which brings general education and exceptional education students together through inclusive, team-based competition. Under her guidance, the program has grown in participation and spirit, promoting equity and engagement for all.

Whitney Hall is more than an outstanding Educational Assistant—she is a trusted mentor, a creative leader, and a tireless advocate for students. Her work reflects the very best of P-H-M's values and continues to make a lasting difference in the lives of students and staff alike.
